- 1. Introduction: Tourism involves exploring new areas. An understanding, awareness & sensitivity to the general environment lead to its appreciation. The knowledge of the existence of natural as well as man-made environment brings home the point that nature and man can co-exist together. Course provides knowledge of the different components of the environment and how human beings interact with it.
- 2. Course Description: A survey of the physical geography of East Africa; landform including the Rift Valley and associated highlands. Geographical structure and soils. Climatic background; the unexpected aridity of East Africa. Ecological variability. East Africa as a cultural heath of man. People and cultures of East Africa both past and present. Comparative study of the demographic situation. Research potentials and exploitation including agriculture, forestry, wildlife, minerals. Economic infrastructure industry, transport and communications, trade, banking. Tourism attractions and products, facilities, services and infrastructure development alternatives for East Africa. Students' understanding is vital since tourism in Africa and East Africa in particular is mainly nature based.
- **3.** Course Objective: The main objective of this course is to introduce students to the concept of environment and how it relates to tourism from the perspective of the East Africa geography.
- 4. Learning Objectives: After completing this course, students should be able to:-
 - Critically analyses environmental issues, features and influence on tourism development in East Africa.
 - Describe the geographical structure of East Africa including climate, landforms, drainage, vegetation etc. in relation to tourism activities in East Africa
 - Explain the relationship between human and physical environment in shaping tourism activities in East Africa.
 - Demonstrate and understanding of the East Africa ecology including its components, history, values in tourism ecological measurements etc.
 - Identify and discuss various perspectives of peopling and culture in East Africa
 - Explain the East African economic environment in relation to tourism development
